

# Summary of eBird Data

Winter Wings Festival 2011

February 17-20

This was our third year recording festival observations with eBird, and it was without question our best year yet! Field trips and other observations during the Winter Wings Festival in 2011 recorded a total of **113 species** and hundreds of thousands of individual birds. Previous species totals were 82 in 2009 and 93 in 2010. The higher species count and the overall increase in the number of birds reported was due to the dedicated efforts of the festival coordinators, the Klamath Bird Observatory, and especially our terrific field trip leaders and assistants.

The waterfowl and raptors for which the Basin and the festival are so famous put in their typically impressive showing on the National Wildlife Refuges. High counts from individual checklists topped **100,000 birds** for both **Greater White-fronted** and **Snow/Ross's Geese** on Saturday. Every expected species of raptor was found at some point during the festival, and a high count of **139 Bald Eagles** was recorded at the Sunday morning flyout from Bear Valley National Wildlife Refuge.

A complete species list is on the next page. Notable species that were added to the overall festival records in eBird this year included **Red-breasted Merganser, Eared Grebe, Turkey Vulture, Long-billed Dowitcher, Glaucous-winged Gull, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Black and Say's Phoebe, Gray Jay, Clark's Nutcracker, Black-capped Chickadee, Brown Creeper, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Mountain Bluebird, Hermit and Varied Thrush, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Lincoln's Sparrow, Red Crossbill**, and last but not even close to least, **White-winged Crossbill**. White-winged Crossbill is a very rare species in the Basin, and this one showed up at a feeder in front of a group of photographers participating in a field workshop on digiscoping!

One notable miss was a lack of any reports of Harlan's Red-tailed Hawks, but at least 3 were found in the area the very next weekend. Considering some of the species that were also missed, including Downy Woodpecker, Tree Swallow, Rock and Marsh Wren, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Brown-headed Cowbird, Purple and Cassin's Finch, Pine Siskin, and Evening Grosbeak, the Basin clearly has the potential to produce sightings of over 120 species during the festival.

Please join us in observing the diversity and abundance of bird life in the Klamath Basin in 2012!
